This course is an introduction to the economic analysis of the behavior of consumers and firms, market price determination, and the allocation of resources. During sections we will discuss the handouts, review difficult concepts covered in lectures and focus on technical tools that you need for solving exercises and the exam. All of the section material and announcements will be posted on **bCourses**. **Attendance** to sections is mandatory since there will be 7 unannounced "pop" quizzes (10% of your total course grade). You should attend the section in which you are registered, not my other section.
